Madeline Moore: My husband and I are both millennials in Chinook WA and we own a small bakery and a small metal working business. My husband also works as a distiller at a small distillery. You've got to

Cassie: We have a locally run online 'magazine' that tries to feature all the local events around town. FB events are one of the ways everyone shares things from what I've seen.

Dayna Singleton - Town of Kershaw: We had a problem getting what is going on out in our community - now that we have started Heart & Soul we worked on the communication aspect of it first. The Town's website has been revamped and has gained back the trust of the community as a reliable source of information; also the Town has a social media presence that has been received by the community with enthusiasm in addition having a good relationship with the local as well as the county newspaper for

getting information out.
